






What is lobbying?

People or groups trying to influence public policy or government decisions.

- Building relationships
- Seeking influence
- 3 Shaping laws





How to lobby

Ask yourself three questions:

- 1 What do you want to achieve?
- Who is the decision maker?
- What story will you tell?


The prime decision makers

- Premier
- Cabinet ministers (minister of health, finance, etc).
- Senior political staff (in direct contact with the government)
- Members of the legislative assembly (MLAs)
- Government officials (bureaucrats, deputy ministers)
- Political parties (NDP, PC, etc).

YOUR DECISION MAKER MATTERS = YOUR VOTE MATTERS





How voting works






Gender differences among swing voters in Canada 2019





Elections in Manitoba


- The Legislative is made up of 57 MLAs who are voted in based on Manitobans' votes
- There are 57 electoral districts (areas of Manitoba/Winnipeg)
- Each political party has a representative trying to win a majority vote in each area to become an MLA

Quick Overview

An MLA becomes a representative of Manitoba Legislative Assembly when: They win the majority vote in the electoral district they're running in.

The **Premier** is voted in when: The majority of elected MLAs represent their political party.

When an MLA wins their district, no matter who the Premier becomes, they get a seat in the Manitoba Legislative Assembly and remain representing their district.

- Federal Members of Parliament (MPs) Ridings
- 2 Provincial MLAs Constituencies
- Municipal Mayors, reeves, councillors Wards
- First Nations Chief and Council, AFN, AMC, MKO



Government 101 - Manitoba Legislative Assembly

- 1 Lieutenant governer
- 2 Manitoba Legislative Assembly Elected MLAs
- 3 Speaker of the Manitoba Legislative Assembly
- 4 Officers of the Manitoba Legislative Assembly



Government 101 - Executive branch

- 1 Premier
- Cabinet ministers
- 3 Senior political staff

Lobbying for change - Telling your story

- 1 Connect Know your key publics
- 2 Contrast Advocate for an issue the other party is against
- 3 Solve Provide them with a solution (for getting votes)
- Consistent message Know your key points
- Tone Be respectful



How to make politicians work for you

- Tap-tap-tap
- Nothing loud/flashy, but repeated
- Not just send one email, but a steady stream over time
- Not just one call, but regular calls
- Not just one person, but many
- Not rude/aggressive, but firm
- In the grocery store, in person, over the phone
- On social media, all platforms
